 SSC received a presentation on the research priorities developed by the Council

- SSC noted that progress had been made on these priorities since the last review (2017)
 - Council had adopted some of the SSC's previous suggestions
- Grouping into defined categories, and use of the spreadsheet format made examination and review easy



- SSC feedback
 - Priorities defined as urgent could be further refined by highlighting those that apply to multiple species and have not been addressed through any research
 - Could then be identified as the highest priority items and added to a cover letter to highlight above the other items



- SSC feedback
 - Cross cutting issues are important and should receive special attention
 - When only looking at specific stocks or assessments, it is easy to miss systemic issues

 Upon review of other Council priority lists, the MAFMC approach was noted as one that seemed an effective approach



- SSC feedback
 - SSC also has research recommendations,
 perhaps these could be provided to the PDTs

- Developing research priorities is a substantial undertaking, would be useful to define how it's used to assess its effectiveness in initiating and funding needed research
 - Would help in creating the lists to target research in effective/constructive ways



- SSC feedback
 - There was limited inclusion of social science priorities and, in cases where it was identified, they are longer term, therefore likely to receive lesser consideration

- Some of the social science items identified should be reprioritized
 - SSC is willing to offer more detail on which items could be reprioritized if wished



- SSC feedback, gap analysis
 - Allocation issues that arise from stocks with shifting distribution due to climate change

 Reducing bycatch (as presented in the letter from the SAFMC to the MAFMC and NEFMC)

 Addressing physiological aspects of species as they relate to climate change



- SSC feedback, gap analysis
 - "Human Dimensions" can fit in many of the existing priorities, All priorities could be reevaluated with regard to the Human Dimension broad category, so this does not get missed

 Many of the items offered were previously offered by the SSC; If the Council wanted, a subgroup of the SSC could be convened to address these previously mentioned issues



Summary

- The SSC provided comment on the Council's research priorities, generally:
 - SSC appreciates the progress made on the priorities since the last review
 - Identified gaps:
 - allocation issues from shifting stock distributions
 - bycatch reduction research
 - reviewing social and economic research priorities
 - Priorities could undergo additional vetting to highlight the highest priorities across FMPs and species, especially if not yet addressed
