Hello Deirdre and members of the Scallop AP and Scallop Committee:

I am writing to ask you to recommend Alternative 2.5.3 in Framework 26. This alternative will give individual states the ability to craft State Water Exemptions if and as they wish to allow Federally permitted scallop fishermen to participate in state water scallop fisheries regardless of the status of the NGOM TAC.


The state of Maine has a sustainably managed scallop fishery that is a critical component of the winter income of many Maine fishermen. Those Maine fishermen that hold Federal scallop permits have historically been more active (and therefore more dependent on) the scallop fishery those fishermen who hold only a state permit. It makes no sense to prevent Federally permitted scallop fishermen from participating in the state water fishery simply because the TAC in Federal waters has been harvested. Prohibiting these fishermen from participating in the state water fishery will have *no biological impact* on the scallop resource in Federal waters. It is also unlikely to have any biological impact on the resource in state waters, since the state of Maine employs a trigger mechanism to shut down areas once they believe a certain biomass has been removed.

I understand that individual states may wish to handle this issue differently. It is for this reason that I ask you to recommend Alternative 2.5.3, which will allow states to handle this issue in a way that best suits their needs. Thank you for your work on this matter that is so important to Maine fishermen.



Dear Members of the Scallop Advisory Panel and Scallop Committee:

I am writing to inform you that my first preference would be to support Options 2.2.2 and 2.2.3 in Framework 26, which will enable NGOM permit holders to participate in Maine's state waters fishery regardless of the status of the NGOM TAC. It would also allow states the ability to request exemptions for additional permit types if it seems appropriate. I also wanted to state that in the event that this seems unlikely, then I would support Alternative 2.5.3 as my second choice, which would allow the state of Maine to craft a State Waters Exemption that would enable me as a federal permit holder to participate in the state waters fishery upon which I depend on, as do many others. I would much prefer that as a NGOM Permit holder that the Council would put my first proposal into law, because the fishing industry could really use some stability at this time. Making the NGOM permit permanently exempt in my view could in fact do just that. At this time many federally permitted Maine boats and all of the families that depend on these vessels including mine would see this action as a very positive step.

Dear members of the Scallop Advisory Panel and Scallop Committee:

I am writing to ask you to support Alternative 2.5.3 in Framework 26.

As a Maine fisherman, I make my living by fishing for several species over the course of the year. The NGOM management area was established so that fishermen like me could fish for scallops in the federal waters of the NGOM if and when the resource recovered. But now, the recovery of the resource in the federal waters of the NGOM threatens my ability to take part in Maine's state water fishery, which is an important part of my winter income.

The state of Maine manages its waters responsibly. I hold a NGOM permit because scallop fishing is important to me. Fishermen like me should not be prevented from taking part in Maine's state water fishery simply because we hold a Federal permit. Excluding us from the state water fishery will have no biological impact on the Federal resource and will have little or no biological impact on the state water resource. But it will have a devastating economic impact on all of us.

It's my understanding that other states may wish to handle this issue differently than the state of Maine. I can't pretend to know how important this issue is in other states, but I can tell you first hand the state water scallop fishery is extremely important to many Maine fishermen, and we need this problem solved as quickly as possible. In the interest of getting that done, I urge you to support Alternative 2.5.3, which will allow each state to craft exemptions as they see fit through the State Waters Exemption program.



Dear Members of the New England Fishery Management Council:

We are a group of general category scallop fishermen who fish out of ports up and down the northeastern coast, and the businesses that depend on these fishermen. Please support Mr. Dempsey's motion, tabled on October 1, 2014: "Add to the list of scallop priorities: measures to address localized depletion of inshore areas and to mitigate impacts on the LAGC IFQ fishery." In the middle of a groundfish disaster, this prioritization is something positive and proactive the Council can do for our fishery.

The Council created two very different fisheries within its scallop management plan: limited access and general category. This management plan has been one of the most successful plans in the region and has increased both the amount of scallops in the ocean and the amount that we're allowed to catch. But there are some issues that need to be fixed in order for our two fisheries to work well together. Limited access fishermen use big, efficient boats to fish a scallop stock down before moving on to the next area. To them, it doesn't matter as much if those areas are far away, because they have the equipment to make it offshore. Meanwhile, we general category fishermen use small boats to fish inshore and need the scallop stock close to shore to stay stable in order to do so.

To be clear, no one can argue with the success of the limited access fishing methods, and we don't want to change that. However, we do think the Council should prioritize and discuss how to protect the stability of the inshore fishery, which relies on access to relatively high levels of scallop year after year. Of course, as with any fishery, there will be years when the stock is high and years when the stock is low. But we think that we can and should take action to avoid the lowest lows, like those we're currently seeing, to make this fishery the best it can be overall. We are looking forward to working with all interested fishermen and groups to reach that goal. Fisheries Survival Fund has already reached out to us to begin those conversations, but we need the discussion to be prioritized at the Council level so that we can collaborate more formally.

We're asking you to allow us to discuss these issues with the limited access fleet in our Advisory Panel and Committee meetings so that we can come up with a solution that works for everybody. We want to work with our fellow fishermen so that we can keep fishing. Please let us do so by prioritizing this discussion. Thank you for your consideration.



Dear Chairman Stockwell:

I appreciate the Council's ongoing efforts to address the inability of Virginia-based scallop vessels to bring open area trips back to Virginia's ports. While the scallop fishery has been successfully managed for biological sustainability, Virginia's landings of the species have declined precipitously in recent years. These declines are substantially attributable to the unique inability of Virginia scallop boats to return to their home port off-the-clock when fishing open areas. At this stage in the development of Framework 26, I would encourage the Council to support option 2.8.4 (enabling southbound vessels to clock out at Cape May) as a preferred alternative in the framework to remedy this situation.

Scallops have been the dominant species in Virginia's commercial fisheries since 1978, and have supported one of our best performing fisheries until very recently. Virginia's landings have declined by over 70 percent from 2009 through 2013. This alarming decline in landings imperils the economic viability of Virginia's working waterfronts, and threatens to sever our coastal communities' longstanding social and cultural connections to this historically important fishery.

To the extent that the Council uses "Days-at-sea" to manage this fishery, the management plan should ensure that scallop boats have fair access to and from the fishing grounds throughout the range of the fishery, without disadvantaging fishing communities on the arbitrary basis of their geographic proximity to navigable waters inside the demarcation line. Option 2.8.4 will enable Virginia-based vessels to clock-out at Cape May, New Jersey, which will help to mitigate the present disincentive to bring open area scallop trips back to Virginia ports.
