# International Commission for the Conservation of Atlantic Tunas (ICCAT)

- Management recommendations for tunas, billfish, swordfish, and sharks caught in ICCAT fisheries, as well as bycatch (seabirds, sea turtles)
- Recommendations binding
- Highly Migratory Species Management Division implements ICCAT recommendations
- Currently 53 Contracting Parties
- "Annual" Meeting held in Mallorca, November 2019
- None of the Recommendations or Resolutions adopted at the 2019 meeting requires changes to U.S. regulations

### 2019 Meeting – Key U.S. Achievements

#### **Modernization of Fisheries Management**

Comprehensive amendments made to the 50-year-old ICCAT Convention to:

- Bring ICCAT into line with modern fisheries management standards (such as ecosystem approach)
- Clarify ICCAT's mandate in relation to sharks
  - Expands the term "tuna and tuna-like species" to include oceanic, pelagic, and highly migratory sharks and rays
- Ensure that all key fleets targeting ICCAT species are bound by its rules



### 2019 Meeting – Key U.S. Achievements

## **Conservation and Management Plan for Bigeye and Yellowfin Tuna**

- Reduces the TAC for bigeye tuna from 65,000 mt to 62,500 mt (2020) and 61,500 mt (2021)
- Protects juvenile bigeye and yellowfin, including:
  - Atlantic-wide closure for use of fish aggregating devices (FADs) (2 months in 2020; 3 months starting 2021)
    - FAD closure previously limited to the Gulf of Guinea and for only 2 months
  - Reduced FAD deployments per vessel
- Expected to reduce juvenile mortality of bigeye and enable the stock to begin rebuilding

### 2019 Meeting – Key U.S. Achievements

## Rebuilding Programs for Atlantic Blue Marlin and White Marlin (co-sponsored by US)

- Includes landings limits and a buffer for reported dead discards, consistent with scientific advice
- Reduces annual limit for blue marlin from 2,000 mt to 1,670 mt; white marlin set at 355 mt
- Maintains U.S. annual retention limit of 250 recreationally-caught marlin

### Protection of Observers (initially proposed by US)

- Protects the safety of observers in ICCAT's regional observer programs
- Now harmonized with global initiatives



### 2019 Meeting – U.S. Priorities Addressed

#### **Sharks**

- A one-year extension of current management measures for North Atlantic shortfin make shark while ICCAT works toward a comprehensive rebuilding program
- Precautionary TAC for North Atlantic blue shark (39,102 mt)
- A U.S. proposal to require that sharks be landed with fins naturally attached gained 32 co-sponsors, the highest number to date, but was not ultimately adopted at this meeting



### 2019 Meeting – U.S. Priorities Addressed

#### **Atlantic Bluefin Tuna**

- A stock assessment update is scheduled in 2020 to provide scientific advice for 2021 and 2022, while Management Strategy Evaluation (MSE) work continues
- A new Working Group on control and traceability measures



### 2019 Meeting – U.S. Priorities Addressed

#### Other

- Update of the MSE road map, outlining next steps for swordfish, albacore, bluefin, and tropical tunas MSE
- A measure encouraging boarding and inspection of vessels without nationality and non-member vessels
- Expansion of the inspection pilot program to include bluefin farms and traps
- Continued development of reporting systems to improve monitoring and compliance
- Improvements to the compliance review process
- A measure on loss and abandonment of fishing gear



### 2019 Meeting – U.S. Priorities NOT Addressed

#### **Shortfin Mako**

- The United States advanced a no retention measure that also offered an incentive to member nations if they reduced their mortality of shortfin make by 80%, which would have resulted in needed mortality reductions
- This reduction has already been achieved by the United States domestically through Amendment 11 implementation
- Unfortunately, there were competing proposals and we could not gain the required consensus



### ICCAT - Work Ahead

#### Other

 The United States will continue to push ICCAT and its parties to be forward leaning and to prioritize the implementation of measures to conserve and manage ICCAT species

#### **Key 2020 Intersessionals:**

- Panel 1 (tropical tunas) focus on FAD management, allocations to Parties, electronic monitoring, observer coverage, and compliance
- Panel 4 (sharks, etc.) continued discussion on development of shortfin make rebuilding program
- Working Group on Integrated Monitoring Measures
