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Enforcement and Compliance

Summary

Since the last Council meeting, there were 55 documented patrols, allowing critical face-to-face interaction between our field staff and the industry; 81 documented instances of outreach (not an exhaustive list; includes phone calls with industry, dock visits, trade shows, presentations, etc.); and 6 meetings. This list does not include the extensive outreach that the VMS team provides on a daily basis, nor can it fully capture the interaction our agents, officers, and support staff regularly have with industry.




Figure 1: 235 incidents reported from October 1, 2018 through December 31, 2018. The chart is broken down by patrols, outreach, and meetings.




Figure 2: Incidents opened from October 1, 2018 through December 31, 2018. 235 incidents were opened.




Figure 3. Status of incidents from October 1, 2018 – December 31, 2018 (135 completed, 100 ongoing).




Figure 4. Incident Dispositions from October 1, 2018 – December 31, 2018 (135 completed, 100 ongoing)

Enforcement Highlights

Seafood Fraud Conspiracy

Two defendants that were indicted in a seafood fraud scheme turned themselves in to the Eastern District of Long Island. Both are charged with conspiracy to commit wire fraud and violate the Lacey Act. They were released on their own recognizance.

Interfering with Coast Guard Inspection

Thomas Simpson, a New Bedford, MA, based multi-species captain was sentenced in the District of Massachusetts to two years of probation in which the first four months are to be served in home confinement. His sentence also included a \$15,000.00 fine, 100 hours of community service and a \$100.00 special assessment. In August 2018, Simpson pleaded guilty to one count of destruction or removal of property subject to seizure and inspection. In 2014, the USCG boarded the FV Bulldog, captained by Simpson. During the course of the boarding, the USCG instructed Simpson to haul his nets back onto the vessel for inspection. Simpson ignored multiple lawful commands to haul his nets in for inspection and continued to place his winch controls in the "free spool" position resulting in the loss of his fishing gear into the ocean. The fishing gear was later recovered during a joint USCG/NOAA salvage operation and found to be noncompliant.

Focused Operations

Maine Port of Entry Operation

A joint operation between NOAA Law Enforcement and U.Ss Customs Border Patrol was conducted at the Calais, ME Port of Entry on the Eastern US-Canadian border. The operation consisted of four continuous days and nights during the week preceding the Christmas holiday in response to the seasonal influx of large amounts of Canadian seafood entering the US, supplying the holiday demand. OLE personnel logged approx. 250 hours to inspect 35 refrigerated container truck shipments.

Note: There are 425 groundfish sector vessels and 119 common pool vessels registered to the NE VMS Program. A total of 177 VMS-equipped vessels are on a NMFS -approved LOE; of these 177 vessels, the owners of 69 vessels have deactivated their VMS with their vendor during the LOE period. There are 39 sector and 10 common pool vessels on an LOE.

Significant VMS Issues:

Investigative Analyst Position. Just prior to the Partial Government Shutdown, we submitted a recommendation to NOAA Workforce Management to fill a new investigative analyst, ZA-1805-II/III, position in Gloucester. This individual will access VMS and other fishery-dependent data, and employ analytical tools to provide information/intelligence and targeting packages to improve how we employ our limited agent/officer resources.

VMS Industry Contact Log Report:

The NE VMS Team addressed 433 industry issues this quarter and closed 270 issues. The most-frequently reported issues were Eforms Compliance, Declaration/Forms Assistance, and Non-reporting. A total of 33 issues were referred, primarily to VMS vendors, GARFO SFD, and GARFO APSD.




Figure 5: Status of contacts from October 1, 2018 – December 31, 2018 (270 closed, 163 remain open).
